Dear Friends,

As a little girl, I stood at my grandfather's knees and leaned over the bridge at the headwaters of the Henry's Fork. My grandfather clasped my shoulder while I held the wood rail tightly with one hand and, with the other, dropped tufts of Wonder bread into the river. He pointed and I squealed when a big rainbow trout flashed out of the bridge's shadow to snag a piece of bread.

As a grown-up these days, I am compelled every time I ski across Murphy's Bridge on the Harriman Trail to slide to a stop and look down at the Big Wood River weaving a black line between snow-laden rocks and banks. I listen to the water whisper as it slips under sheets of ice. I watch shadows dance where the ice is thin.

"Stories of life are often more like rivers than books," writes Norman Maclean in A River Runs through It. His book is a fishing story, and it is a story about longing to care for the people and the places that we love. Rivers are never bound by a single story – they eddy and flood and even disappear at times of drought. And stories of life are never static. The best stories invite us to look over a bridge and spot some magic at work in the riffles.

stuttering. The river becomes a peaceful teacher and place of wonder and peace.




"Once there was a river..." Adventure ensues when bear comes along, and it builds and builds as more characters join the fray. This is a story about friendship, a sense
